



Top Honors

The chicken tasted OK, but it was a tough thing to chew. It was rubbery, like chicken always is at these sorts of events. There were roasted potatoes and grilled green beans on the side, so that helped. And each place setting included a generous wedge of cherry pie. The occasion was the annual Citizen of the Year banquet.
