

News From High Valley

Straw Claus



"Honey, where are my pants?" Bob Jarland usually dressed himself and never was uncertain about the location of his pants. Dress pants on the lower bar, right end of the closet. Jeans in the bottom right drawer of the dresser, just below the socks and underwear drawers. "I had a whole drawer full of them Monday and now they are all gone!"

Judy Jarland had heard it all before. "I shouldn't have to remind you that it is almost Christmas, so you do know where your pants are, Bob. If you don't like it, you can just go to the store and get more pants!" Judy didn't seem to have much sympathy for Bob. She had spent a lot of their marriage helping Bob find what was right under his nose, so today wasn't much different.

"Oh, that's right. Sorry Dear. I forgot. How could that have slipped my mind?" Bob resigned himself to wearing sweatpants and finished getting dressed for his Saturday chores and errands. "I'm going to get downtown to check the mail and pick up some more pants. Do we need straw or hats? I can pick up more if we need them." "Yes," shouted Judy.
